Neighbors: something to think about

Internet access: all but ten households in the association have access to internet. Those ten rely on hand-delivery of this newsletter and other essential mailings, but do NOT receive the shorter email messages that go out to everyone else. This includes things like Marketplace listings, the ever-changing schedule for our recent road work, alerts when we learn of someone's death, etc. If you know that one of your neighbors doesn't have internet, try to pass along any information that you receive via email from Waterway Pines.

Serving your community by serving on the board: The terms of three of our seven board members expire in December. Two persons have volunteered, but <u>that's not enough</u>. Historically, we have sometimes had only the number of volunteers we have needed. But at least twice in the last seven years, we have had a competitive election. There are lots of reasons to serve on the board (see past newsletters), but the best is this: board service allows you to make a direct contribution to the success of the association, which is a significant component to the value of your own property. A well-functioning board manages the budget, maintains the buildings and grounds, communicates to residents, and plans for the future. You could be a part of that.



What's the alternative to a volunteer board?

Answer: a management company. We are aware of at least one local association moving in that direction, chiefly because residents are not willing or able to volunteer. They anticipate such a move will cost \$40-\$50 a month in additional HOA fees. Moreover, there will still have to be a residents' board to interface with the management company. Our current board sees this as an additional and expensive layer of administration between co-owners and the various vendors who work for us. We hope we do not have to resort to this solution.

Repair and maintenance work:

A number of co-owners are waiting on repairs of different kinds. We haven't forgotten you. However, we are still having difficulty securing contractors. We are trying to address work issues as quickly as possible with the resources available to us at this time. We appreciate your patience, and are hopeful that this situation will improve soon.
