


# Newsletter, February 2022

## Building and maintenance activity: December and January

Surprisingly, a lot has happened—due to some mild weather in December.

- Three sidewalks were lifted to eliminate the trip hazard
- Ten sunrooms received new support posts (This was a long-delayed project.)
- A crack in a lower-level foundation was sealed

Not surprisingly, it appears as though work in 2022 will continue to be plagued by supply issues, something that is true for nearly all building materials and nearly all contractors. We will do our best to keep co-owners informed.

## **Dormant shrub pruning**

The board contracted with DJs to do this on the north end of the association, and they have completed or nearly completed that work. The board will evaluate the effects of this pruning, and if they are satisfied with the results, will do it on the remainder of the property next winter.

## Snow removal, winter 2021-2022

You may recall that last winter was the first time DJs had the contract for our winter plowing and snow removal. In the opinion of the board, they have learned a lot since then, and we see definite improvement:

- Snow piles no longer tower above the street. They are pushing the snow into more small piles than last year.
- Guest parking spaces are mostly open; last year, snow was pushed into guest spaces.
- It appears that driveways are experiencing less damage from snow removal equipment.
- The crews do their work in a timely fashion.

#### **December windstorm cleanup**

Waterway Pines had a terrific windstorm in December that knocked down a number of large pines. Our landscape provider, DJs, removed all the trees that were on the ground or leaning dangerously. Fortunately, none of the trees hit a building. A group of still-standing pines on Timberlake East will be removed when weather permits; each of them is somehow damaged or unstable. All of the stumps will be ground out also—when weather permits.
